4. REF # 6546                    DISCUSSION ITEM:- UPDATE ON THE PROACT PRESCRIPTION DISCOUNT CARD PROGRAM {INITIATED IN ROCKLAND IN JUNE 2011}

**DISCUSSED**

Mr. O'Neil, Program Manage for the Prescription Drug Discount Card Program in Rockland County, gave an overview of this program. He explained that they have been administering the Presentation Drug Discount Card Program in New York State since 2005. Since 2005 residents across New York State have filled more than 4.5 million subscriptions with this program, saving the residents \$2.5 million on their prescription medication. They supply discount cards and they always have a team available to answer all questions that clients may have. They also to reach out to local Community organizations such as food pantries, and shelters.

Chair Soskin asked some clarification on the \$2.5 million going back to the County due to this program? Mr. O'Neil answered this is the amount being saved by the Discounted Card Program holders. This amount is not going back to the County.

Commissioner Sherwood explained that the message from the Department of Social Services was to talk about the programs they offer, the progress being made and how they are managing despite all the changes. She said she joined the department in 2007 with a staff of 464 employees, which is now down to 376. Facing such situation they had to move people around where they were most needed. The food stamp program is growing, as well as Medicaid. Much of the administrative work is now being handled by the State not by the County. Mrs. Sherwood explained that the real challenge is to manage with all the changes taking place. Their job will be to provide continue services with fewer employees.

Chair Soskin asked if they are submitting the claims on time. She replied that they have been submitting the claims in a timely matter.

Leg. Jobson asked if the Medicaid applications being available online. She replied yes.

**Action: Chair Soskin requested that Commissioner Walsh-Tozer to give us her vision of the incident in California (stabbing and shooting) The possibility of it having it take place here. What steps are we taking to ward this in Rockland?**

Chair Soskin asked if Commissioner Walsh-Tozer could list the accomplishments made by the department in this first quarter as well as what is for plan for next quarter. Mrs. Walsh-Tozer stated that she has held her position since 1994. At that time the department counted 450 employees and 16 different programs that were heavily funded by the State. Today things have changes. At the beginning of this year they counted 150 staff and today they have 49 and at the end of July they will have 47. Even the downsizing-taking place, they never closed a program without an alternative. They have been able to utilize staff in cross training in different areas. She is very proud to say that she has a very dedicated staff. One of their accomplishments was the transfer to Nyack Hospital of 43 Psychiatric Inpatients. Achievement was to ensure that the 600 people that received services in the clinic continued. (See Attached)

## **ROCKLAND COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH OVERVIEW OF SERVICES**

The Rockland County Department of Mental Health continues to be both a provider of behavioral health services and, as the Local Governmental Unit, is the lead agency in the Rockland County Local Services system of behavioral health care. The mission of the Department is to ensure and oversee delivery of high quality, comprehensive, person-centered and recovery oriented services for persons in the Rockland community with mental illness, developmental disabilities and chemical dependence. On a very personal level the role of RCDMH is to insure that no client falls through the safety net, which is especially critical today given the many changes occurring in the health care delivery systems.

As the LGU, the Department is responsible for the planning, coordination, administration and budgetary oversight of a comprehensive and integrated service delivery system in which County, State and Voluntary not-for-profit agencies deliver mental health, developmental disabilities and chemical dependency services. The agencies are funded, regulated and/or licensed by the NYS Office of Mental Health (OMH), Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD) and/or Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS). The Mental Hygiene Law governs the delivery of services provided. In addition, each Office has a set of regulations by which programs under its auspices must be in compliance.

Over the next three years NYS OMH is significantly restructuring the systems of care in all counties and redesigning their service delivery systems by the creation of specialty hospitals systems know as Regional Centers of Excellence. This is especially critical to Rockland County in that the Regional Center of Excellence in Rockland County will be Rockland Psychiatric Center located in our backyard. Rockland County Psychiatric Center will become the Regional Inpatient facility for all counties located in the Hudson region and it essential that as LGU for Rockland County that our concerns and those of our patients are addressed during this critical time.

### **LISTED BELOW ARE THE ONGOING ACTIVITIES OF RCDMH.**

#### **POMONA CLINIC**

The Rockland County Department of Mental Health, Pomona Clinic serves Rockland County residents and provides services designed to help people develop skills to effectively manage behavioral and emotional problems, strengthen the family system, resolve acute psychiatric symptoms and formulate effective medication regimens. The clinic's target population includes adults, adolescents and children. The clinic provides 15,000 visits per year to over 900 Rockland County clients.

Our multidisciplinary team uses evidence-based focused interventions addressing behavioral issues associated with presenting problem(s). These services allow individuals to minimize hospitalization, helping individuals to function optimally on an interpersonal, social, educational, and occupational level. Services offered include individual, group and family psychotherapy, psycho-educational groups, psychiatric evaluation and assessment, crisis intervention, and

medication monitoring. The Clinic specializes in working with individuals who have experienced debilitating effects of trauma in their lives. We also liaise with other service providers and assist connecting individuals with appropriate community services.

The Clinic has offered Crisis Management training to various county agencies and businesses in Rockland County, assisting them in managing potentially threatening situations in the workplace. Additionally, the clinic staff provides support for individuals and organizations involved in unforeseen catastrophic events in the community. The clinic provided counseling both on site and in the community after Hurricane Sandy, the Earthquake in Haiti, 911, school suicides and other unexpected deaths.

## **LOCAL GOVERNMENTAL UNIT - MANDATED**

### **Oversight - Mandated**

As the Local Governmental Unit, the Department is responsible for the planning, coordination, administration and budgetary oversight of a comprehensive and integrated service delivery system in which County, State and Voluntary not-for-profit agencies deliver mental health, developmental disabilities and chemical dependency services. The goal is to ensure that all population groups are adequately covered, that sufficient services are available to all persons with mental illness, developmental disabilities and chemical dependence, that there is coordination and cooperation among local, county and state providers of services, and that there is continuity of care among all providers of services.

This goal will continue to be accomplished with enhanced partnership and collaboration with community based and state agencies, other County health and human service departments, recipients and other stakeholders in determining how to best provide services, enhance the delivery of community-based services and promote cross system planning for high risk/high need individuals with disabilities that require services from multiple county departments and service providers. This is especially critical with our many group homes and community residences in which our clients reside that we as Rockland's LGU always provide a safety net so no client falls through the cracks.

### **Local Services Planning - Mandated**

The Department, in collaboration with service providers and other stakeholders, is responsible to review services and local facilities for the mentally disabled of the area for which it serves; determine needs; develop the program of local services; ensure coordination and cooperation among local providers; exercise general supervisory authority over or administer local services; and submit annually a local services plan for the provision of services for OMH, OASAS and OPWDD.

### **Assisted Outpatient Treatment Services - Mandated**

The Department is responsible for coordinating and overseeing the Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) program, established following the enactment of Kendra's Law in August 1999, to provide AOT services for certain mentally ill individuals who, in view of their treatment history and circumstances, are unlikely to survive safely in the community without adequate

supervision. The law establishes a process for obtaining a court order for these individuals to direct them to comply with a court ordered treatment plan. This program requires significant oversight on the part of the Department to ensure the safety of the community.

**Persons Served Annually: 30**

**Contract Management - Mandated**

The Department of Mental Health, as the Local Governmental Unit (LGU), contracts for services with 21 behavioral health agencies. The Department has established a performance based contract management process that includes annual on-site reviews. The goal is to more effectively monitor performance outcomes, service delivery volume, and the cost of service delivery and to ensure compliance with all applicable standards and requirements. Approve 9.39, 9.45 and all other involuntary commitments under the MHY Law.

**9.46 SAFE ACT - MANDATED**

As a result of legislation enacted in March 2013, when a psychiatrist, MD, registered nurse, psychologist or licensed social worker currently providing mental health treatment services to a person determines, in the exercise of reasonable professional judgment, that such person is likely to engage in conduct that would result in serious harm to self or others, he or she shall be required to report, as soon as practicable, to the County Commissioner. The County

Commissioner evaluates the clinical information and, based on her assessment, forwards information to the NYS Department Criminal Justice Services, which results in an individual being denied a pistol permit or revocation of an existing pistol permit in NYS.

#### **EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER - MANDATED**

Coordinate the countywide response for behavioral health services in an emergency situation. RCDMH functions as a liaison with other agencies and providers of service and reports to the NYS OMH, DOH, OASAS, and OPWDD. Staff trained as crisis/disaster mental health responders respond, as needed, to emergency situations in the county. Additionally, RCDMH staff are assigned to Mental Health Coordinator role at the County Emergency Operations Center (EOC), acting as liaison between the Department of Mental Health, the EOC and the many agencies represented at the EOC to provide both the Department of Mental Health and the EOC staff with the information needed to coordinate the Department's response to an emergency situation.

#### **SINGLE POINT OF ACCESS COMMITTEE (SPOA) – MANDATED**

##### **Adult SPOA**

Rockland County's Adult SPOA Committee reviews all requests for Case Management, Assertive Community Treatment, and Housing for county residents with mental illness 18 years of age and older. The committee insures the timely access to needed services, and brings together providers and adjunct supports to help everyone get the help they need and for which they are eligible. The SPOA Chair works with referral sources, families, and hospitals to insure a smooth transition to appropriate care. Applications are reviewed daily and followed up until services are in place. Individuals are welcome to attend SPOA to meet providers and insure their wishes are respected and the services person-centered.

##### **Child and Adolescent SPOA**

The Child and Adolescent SPOA Committee is a service provided to children with serious emotional disturbance and their families, reviewing applications for Case Management and OMH Home and Community Based Waiver Services to support each family in their wish to keep their child at home, with specialized treatment, school, and other supports such as respite. The Child and Adolescent SPOA is comprised of child and family serving agency representatives as well as members of other county departments working with families to prevent unnecessary out of home placements. An evidence-based practice of networking with families and schools to put together an individualized plan of support is an essential feature of SPOA.

The SPOA committees are the "go to" place for and complicated and individualized planning and service requests, generating cross systems collaboration and county-wide needs assessment and feedback. Each SPOA Chair is able to respond to emergency request and works closely with other county departments and agencies.

## **APPROVAL OF HCBS WAIVER OF LEVEL OF CARE (LOC) AND INITIAL SERVICE PLAN (ISP) FORMS – MANDATED**

The HCBS Waiver provided by St. Dominic's Home, ensures that children and families have access to services that are culturally relevant and that lead to improved resiliency, the achievement of age specific developmental imperatives and a supportive home environment. The target population for the HCBS Waiver is children and adolescents:

- with serious emotional disturbance.
- between the ages of 5 and 17 years (prior to 18th birthday),
- who demonstrate complex health and mental health needs,
- who are at imminent risk of admission to a psychiatric institutional level of care or have a need for continued psychiatric hospitalization,
- whose service and support needs cannot be met by just one agency/system,
- who are capable of being cared for in the home and/or community if services are provided,
- who have a viable and consistent living environment with parents/guardians who are able and willing to participate in the HCBS Waiver\*, and
- who can reasonably be expected to be served under the HCBS Waiver at a cost which does not exceed that of psychiatric institutional care.

The HCBS Waiver utilizes a strength-based, individualized care model to promote wellness, leading to success for the child and family. It ensures effective interventions by implementing a collaborative partnership with the family, treatment provider(s), core waiver services and other natural supports.

There are six specific services that comprise the HCBS Waiver. The services are: Individual Care Coordination, Respite, Intensive In Home, Skill Building, Family Support Services and Crisis Response. Each child must have Individual Care Coordination. The remaining five services are selected as indicated by the child, family and ICC to support goals and objectives in the Service Plan.

The Department is required the LOC form (two signatures) and one signature is required for the initial SP. It is also required that the two signatures represent two different disciplines unless the LGU has requested a waiver.

## **FORENSIC MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE - MANDATED**

Provides psychiatric and psychological evaluations and consultations to all of the courts (Family, Justice, County, Supreme) and law-related agencies in Rockland County. Conducts mandated CPL 730 competency exams. Also provides training and consultation in psychiatric-legal subjects to the staffs of agencies serving the judicial system and serves as liaison between County law-related agencies (e.g., Probation Department, Corrections Department) and County and State psychiatric facilities.

**BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES – ROCKLAND COUNTY JAIL  
MANDATED JAIL SERVICES FOR SHERIFFS DEPT.**

The Department of Mental Health provides a Behavioral Health Care Team for the Rockland County Jail that works in collaboration with Correctional Health Services and Corrections to address and manage the range of Behavioral Health needs and risks presented by the inmate population. The Rockland County Correctional Facility is accredited through the National Commission of Correctional Health Care for the provision of health and behavioral health services at the jail site.

The Behavioral Health Team provides screening, psychiatric evaluation, behavioral health assessments, suicide risk identification and prevention, medication management, crisis intervention and stabilization, substance abuse treatment, referral to inpatient psychiatric care, referral for CPL 730 competency evaluations and transitional case management as part of an ongoing strategic risk management plan at the facility. The Behavioral Health Team provides consultation to Correctional Health and Corrections staff in identifying and managing behavioral health issues that emerge during an inmate's incarceration. Inmates placed on suicide watch as well as inmates with serious and persistent mental illness are a priority focus for the Behavioral Health Team. Behavioral Health works closely with community providers and agencies, criminal justice entities, judicial and legal services, and family members to develop post release service plans for the inmates in order to promote continuity of care upon release and provide referrals to and accommodations for alternative to incarceration programs.

The Team also provides training in the jail. Both Behavioral Health social workers are Certified Suicide Prevention Trainers and participate in the training of new corrections officers and sheriff's deputies in suicide prevention. Social workers also provide mental health training to corrections and health service personnel.

**SEX OFFENDER BEHAVIORAL MANAGEMENT PROGRAM**

The Rockland County Sexual Offender Behavioral Management Program is located in the County Government Buildings located in New City, New York. (845) 638-5138.

The primary goal of the Sexual Offender Behavioral Management Program is to provide a higher level of community protection by assisting individuals who have engaged in illegal or deviant sexual behavior. Kurt Bumby, of the Center for Sex Offender Management in November 2006, defined treatment with this population as "prescribed interventions as a means of managing crime-producing factors and promoting positive and meaningful goal attainment for participants, all in the interest of enhancing public safety."

The Rockland County Sexual Offender Behavioral Management Program focuses on training participants to modify, control, and monitor their inappropriate sexual behavior to avoid future acting out. Our program utilizes the "containment approach" of working collaboratively with vested agencies and persons in managing these participants in the community, which is

considered best practice in the field of sex offender supervision and treatment. (Association for the Treatment of Sexual Offenders: Practice Standards and Guidelines, 2005)

The Rockland County Sexual Offender Behavioral Management Program works as part of a community -wide team effort that includes the criminal justice system stakeholders such as probation, parole, law enforcement, judicial system, victim advocate groups and DSS in order to promote effective community risk management strategies.

The Rockland County Sex Offender Behavioral Management Program recognizes that an essential component of managing sex offenders is the provision of sex offender specific treatment that is designed to promote offender accountability and enhance skills and competencies in order to reduce the likelihood of re-offending. In order to meet this standard, clinical staff working with this population needs specialized training, as well as ongoing education, to ensure competency in the evolving field of sexual offender practice standards.

The Rockland County Sexual Offender Behavioral Management Program is committed to utilizing best practices standards in order to promote effective community risk management strategies in the management of this population.

**Persons Served Annually: 60**

These forensic programs cost almost 1.5 million dollars in Forensic treatment services to the Rockland County Jail, Rockland County Family Courts & Sex Offender Treatment in conjunction with Dept. of Probation, which is not reimbursable by any third party payers

#### **CONSUMER ADVOCATE**

The Consumer Advocate is available to ensure Department of Mental Health consumers' rights are respected. The role of the Consumer Advocate is to respond to complaints related to consumer care. When complaints are filed the Consumer Advocate works with consumers to obtain a resolution to their complaint. In addition to responding to concerns, the Consumer Advocate provides information on services and resources available to consumers and their families.

#### **EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

Confidential assessment and referral program designed to offer professional help to employees who need assistance with personal problems or concerns. Although not mandated, the program is available to all Rockland County employees and their families as per the agreement with the various unions. The purpose is to provide early identification and prevention as well as referral to appropriate professional counseling.
