Item: *CONGREGATION KHAL BINYAN DAVID D'HEL/272 BLAUVELT ROAD (R-2687)*

Variances for front setback, front yard, side setback, total side setback, rear setback, development coverage, floor area ratio and deck rear setback to allow the construction of an addition to and the conversion of a two-family dwelling to a three-family dwelling with three accessory apartments on .2603 gross acres (.2529 net acres) in an R-15C zoning district.

East side of Blauvelt Road, approximately 325 feet south of Carlton Road

Reason for Referral:

Village of Kaser, NYS Route 306

The County of Rockland Department of Planning has reviewed the above item. Acting under the terms of the above GML powers and those vested by the County of Rockland Charter, I, the Commissioner of Planning, hereby:

****Disapprove***

1 Permitting development that does not comply with the applicable bulk standards can set an undesirable land use precedent and result in the overutilization of individual sites. The applicant is seeking a 30 percent increase over the maximum permitted development coverage, as well as numerous yard and setback variances. The very generous floor area ratio standard of .90 is also exceeded. The ability of the existing infrastructure to accommodate increased residential density on non-complying parcels is a countywide concern and must be evaluated. This evaluation must consider whether local roads will become more congested and the sewer system, stormwater management systems and the public water supply will be overburdened. The Town must consider the cumulative and regional impacts of permitting such development. The building footprint of the proposed addition and the number of units must be reduced so that the R-15C bulk standards are achieved.

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2 Pre-existing, non-conforming lots are given special consideration under Section 376-131.D.(1) of the Town's Zoning Law. The bulk standards for several residential zoning districts are relaxed to accommodate the residential uses permitted by right in these zones. The subject site is 11,017 SF or 26.6 percent smaller than the minimum lot area of 15,000 SF required for new three-family residences on conforming parcels in the R-15C zoning district. As noted above, numerous and substantial variances are required for this proposal. Given that the site benefits from the application of Section 376-131.D.(1), the building footprint and the number of units shall be reduced to comply with the requisite standards.

The following comments address our additional concerns about this proposal.

3 The Village of Kaser is one of the reasons this proposal was referred to this department for review. The municipal boundary is along the southern and eastern property lines of the site. New York State General Municipal Law states that the purposes of Sections 239-l, 239-m and 239-n shall be to bring pertinent inter-community and countywide planning, zoning, site plan and subdivision considerations to the attention of neighboring municipalities and agencies having jurisdiction. Such review may include inter-community and county-wide considerations in respect to the compatibility of various land uses with one another; traffic generating characteristics of various land uses in relation to the effect of such traffic on other land uses and to the adequacy of existing and proposed thoroughfare facilities; and the protection of community character as regards predominant land uses, population density, and the relation between residential and nonresidential areas. In addition, Section 239-nn was enacted to encourage the coordination of land use development and regulation among adjacent municipalities, and as a result development occurs in a manner that is supportive of the goals and objectives of the general area.

The Village of Kaser must be given the opportunity to review the proposal and its impact on community character, traffic, water quantity and quality, drainage, stormwater runoff and sanitary sewer service. The areas of countywide concern noted above that directly impact the Village of Kaser must be considered and satisfactorily addressed, as well as any additional concerns about the proposal.

4 A review must be completed by the New York State Department of Transportation, and any required permits obtained.

5 A review must be completed by the Rockland County Health Department to ensure compliance with Article XIX (Mosquito Control) of the Rockland County Sanitary Code.

6 A review must be completed by the Rockland County Sewer District #1, and all required permits obtained.

7 The proposed residential building must comply with all requirements of the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code.


8 A review must be completed by the Rockland County Office of Fire and Emergency Services, the Town of Ramapo Fire Inspector, or the Monsey Fire Department to ensure that there is sufficient maneuverability on site for fire trucks, in the event an emergency arises.

9 All proposed building entrances, exterior stairways, window wells and walkways must be delineated on the site plan demonstrating that they will not impact yard requirements or increase the development coverage. Variances of a greater magnitude may be required, and parking maneuverability affected.

10 It will difficult for vehicles parked in spaces 3 or 6 to maneuver out of the spots without a turnaround area. No building entrances, exterior stairways or walkways are shown on the site plan, making it difficult to assess the parking area in relation to the pedestrian movement on site, and whether there will be safety issues for the residents. A turnaround area must be provided so that vehicles do not have to back out into the roadway, and the building entrances, exterior stairways or walkways must be illustrated on the site plan so that safety issues can be properly evaluated.

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- 11 The development coverage and floor area ratio calculations must be provided on the site plan so their accuracy can be verified.
- 12 As noted in the September 12, 2018 denial letter from the Building Department, the existing porch with steps, on the north side of the structure, cannot be used as a required means of egress due to the change in use, as per the 2015 edition of the International Building Code. This must be labeled to be removed.
- 13 A dumpster enclosure must be shown on the site plan and easily accessible to sanitation workers. Parked vehicles must not block access.
- 14 The last column of the bulk table must be corrected to specify the deck rear setback standard.
- 15 The site plan shall contain map notes that list all appropriate information, including the district details.
- 16 Pursuant to the Rockland County Sanitary Code, Article XIII, Section 13.8.1, all multiple dwellings with three or more rental units must register and obtain a Multiple Dwelling Rental Certificate (MDRC). If this proposed multi-family dwelling meets the requirements of the Multiple Dwelling Rental Registry requirement, then the owner must register and obtain the MDRC. Failure to comply is a violation of Article XIII, which may result in penalties of \$2,000 per day.
- 17 Pursuant to General Municipal Law (GML) Section 239-m and 239-n, if any of the conditions of this GML review are overridden by the board, then the local land use board must file a report with the County Commissioner of Planning of the final action taken. If the final action is contrary to the recommendation of the Commissioner, the local land use board must state the reasons for such action.
- 18 In addition, pursuant to Executive Order 01-2017 signed by County Executive Day on May 22, 2017, County departments are prohibited from issuing a County permit, license, or approval until the report is filed with the County Commissioner of Planning. The applicant must provide to any County agency which has jurisdiction of the project: 1) a copy of the Commissioner report approving the proposed action; or 2) a copy of the Commissioner of Planning recommendations to modify or disapprove the proposed action, and a certified copy of the land use board statement overriding the recommendations to modify or disapprove, and the stated reasons for the land use board's override.

**NYS General Municipal Law Section 239 requires a vote of a 'majority plus one' of your agency to act contrary to the above findings.*

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The review undertaken by the Rockland County Planning Department is pursuant to, and follows the mandates of Article 12-B of the New York General Municipal Law. Under Article 12-B the County of Rockland does not render opinions, nor does it make determinations, whether the item reviewed implicates the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act. The Rockland County Planning Department defers to the municipality forwarding the item reviewed to render such opinions and make such determinations if appropriate under the circumstances.

In this respect, municipalities are advised that under the Religious Land Use and Institutionalized Persons Act, the preemptive force of any provision of the Act may be avoided (1) by changing a policy or practice that may result in a substantial burden on religious exercise, (2) by retaining a policy or practice and exempting the substantially burdened religious exercise, (3) by providing exemptions from a policy or practice for applications that substantially burden religious exercise, or (4) by any other means that eliminates the substantial burden.

Proponents of projects are advised to apply for variances, special permits or exceptions, hardship approval or other relief.

Pursuant to New York State General Municipal Law §239-m(6), the referring body shall file a report of final action it has taken with the Rockland County Department of Planning within thirty (30) days after final action. A referring body which acts contrary to a recommendation of modification or disapproval of a proposed action shall set forth the reasons for the contrary action in such report.
